## <u>TEXT</u>

In the old days, the work of the world had been done by independent workmen who sat in their own little workshops in the front of their houses. They owned their tools, boxed the ears of their own apprentices, and within the limits prescribed by their unions, conducted their business as it pleased them. They lived simple lives, and were obliged to work very long hours, but they were their own masters. If they got up and saw that it was a fine day to go fishing, they went fishing and there was no one to say "no".

But the introduction of machinery changed this. A machine is really nothing but a greatly enlarged tool. A railroad train, which carries you at the speed of a mile a minute is in reality a pair of very fast legs, and a steam hammer, which flattens heavy plates of iron, is just a very big fist made of steel.
