- 4 armed conflicts", UNESCO said. Yet, there are valuable reasons for the girls' schooling.
- 5 An African proverb says, "If we educate a boy, we educate one person. If we educate a
- 6 girl, we educate a family and a whole nation". A girl sent to school is far more likely to
- 7 ensure that her children also receive an education. Educated women are also aware of
- 8 the issues related to their health and that of their children. For example, they are less
- 9 likely to get HIV/AIDS or pass it onto their children. They now have the tools to build
- 10 healthy educated families. Child marriage almost results in the end of a girl's schooling.
- 11 Educated girls typically marry later when they are able to bear and care for their
- 12 children. Most important, educated girls have a greater chance of escaping poverty,
- 13 raising the standard of living for their families and their communities.
